

Dr. Rucker Johnson, Associate Professor of Public Policy at UC-Berkeley

Dr. Johnson is an Associate Professor in the Goldman School of Public Policy at the University of California, Berkeley. He is a Faculty Research Fellow for the National Bureau of Economic Research and the W.E.B. DuBois Institute at Harvard University. Dr. Johnson is a recipient of the Fletcher Fellowship Prize from Harvard (2012-2013) for his Book Project on the *Long Legacy of School Desegregation* and is also the author of *Mother's Work and Children's Lives: Low-income Families After Welfare Reform* (2010).

Dr. Ophelia Garmon-Brown is a physician, a minister, a volunteer, a caregiver and advocate for the health and well-being of Charlotte community members and beyond. She was named Novant's Vice-President of Physician Services in 2012. She has received numerous awards for her service to the community including the 2011 Thurgood Marshall Award and 2012 Family Physician of the Year from the North Carolina Academy of Family Physicians. In addition to her professional and philanthropic positions, she also serves many local and statewide organizations, which include, but are not limited to, the Project Lift Governance Board and Co-Chair of the Charlotte Mecklenburg Opportunity Task Force.
